United Way launches new financial stability initiative for community

The United Way has launched a new initiative to address financial stability issues in our community. A Financial Stability Summit was held on April 2 to determine what specific economic and financial needs are the most pressing for people in the Greater St. Joseph area and to discuss potential strategies to address those needs.

The April 2 Summit was the birth of a new local movement that will help the St. Joseph area better assure the financial stability of the people who live here for years to come.

Social services provide assistance to help people facing financial problems, but social services cannot tackle all the economic concerns people face. Therefore, the Financial Stability Summit, coordinated by United Way, brought local leaders from all sectors together for the sake of the financial well-being of individuals and families. Thirty-one leaders from the banking industry, private businesses, government agencies and the non-profit sector attended.

- Impacting Regulations and Policies
- Increasing use of Earned Income

Marvin's history with United Way began 51 years ago as an employee of a family-owned business, The Home Oil & Gas


Corporation. Even when he became president of the company, he served

United Way begins developing a Volunteer Center

United Way of Greater St. Joseph is developing a local Volunteer Center. The first Volunteer Center Advisory Committee meeting on May 4 was attended by representatives of non-profit agencies, educational institutions, and corporations.

Volunteer positions serve an important function in a community, especially during an economic downturn. Through volunteering, individuals can expand their networks for job searches and increase their job skills. Non-profit agencies often depend on volunteers for important labor and special projects that cannot be covered by budgets. Currently, when someone in our community wishes to volunteer somewhere, the person must call around to inquire at many different locations, asking about their volunteer needs, often in a hit-and-miss fashion. Many agencies in town have volunteer opportunities or would like to have leadership in developing a volunteer program but don't have the staff or the time required.

People Served Help Others Thanks to Cooperation Between Two Local United Way Agencies

Did you know that United Cerebral Palsy of Northwest Missouri (UCP) and InterServ, two United Way parnter agencies, have been teaming up for over 15 years to enable people who are receiving services to give back to our community?

This past year, UCP staff worked with twenty-five adults with developmental disabilities served by UCP's Adult Program as they took turns on a rotating schedule delivering Mobile Meals through InterServ. They delivered nine routes, which means nearly 140 people who might not otherwise have eaten well, had hot meals delivered to their doors.

Not only are recipients' nutritional needs met through the Mobile Meals program, but sometimes their meal delivery is the only interaction they have for the day. UCP adult participants and some of the long-term InterServ meal patrons enjoy a short visit during the meal delivery, benefitting both the deliverer and the person who receives the meal. This partnership is a win-win situation for participating UCP adults, people confined to their residence due to disability or illness who depend on InterServ for regular nutrition, United Way and our community as a whole.

United Way encourages our community and agencies to LIVE UNITED, and the photo above shows an excellent example of how individuals and agencies in our community are doing just that. Hooray to UCP and InterServ for such a long-term commitment to advance the common good in our community.
