Following the end of World War II, Jane was among the many young war brides to return to the St. Joseph community. At that time, most husbands made their Community Chest (United Way)

contributions through work places, while she, along with others, went door to door to collect donations from wives, mothers, and senior citizens who remained at home.

In addition to volunteering for United Way, Jane was the Director for the Mental Health Association, at that time a United Way agency. Education and referrals were provided, but no services.

Your support of United Way impacted lives

As you likely know, United Way focuses on education, financial stability, and health because these are the building blocks for a good life. In 2009, campaign dollars were allocated to 18 Partner Agencies, 7 United Way Initiatives/Programs, and many other local programs. Below is a highlight of a few recent achievements made possible through your support.

Education

- •1,494 children attended preschools and child care at United Way Partner Agencies.
- •229 children with disabilities or delays received early intervention services to help them reach developmental goals.
- •800 young children benefited from 21 child care centers that participated in a United Way program to improve quality of service and to best prepare children for success.
- •1,008 high school students participated in alcohol crash simulations to learn about the dangers of drinking and driving.
- -8,000 people increased their knowledge of disaster preparedness through disaster education presentations.

Financial Stability

- •1,234 men, women, and children received emergency shelter.
- •Local people kept \$340,000 from being taken from them through

consumer law legal representation.

- •92% of the 702 people who received financial budget counseling were successful in creating budgets to help get them through a financial crisis.
- •Volunteers prepared taxes for 2,227 people, resulting in \$1,523,352 in tax refunds.
- •13,641 referrals to appropriate resources were given to people seeking assistance with financial situations.

Health

- •1,136 patients received mental health counseling through United Way Partner Agencies.
- •97% of the 257 seniors who received in-home and medical services and support avoided premature nursing home placement.
- In our community, where over 25% of the population is obese, 5,647 people participated in vigorous activity for 45 minutes or more, 3 times per week.
- •Through a United Way grant, 339 diabetic patients were provided with glucose testing strips to help them monitor their blood sugar and maintain their overall health to prevent hospitalizations and costly emergency room visits.
- •223 women enhanced their safety and quality of life after violence through crisis therapies and the support of an advocate.

Did you know? In 2009 . . .

- •709 people VOLUNTEERED with United Way.
- •122 volunteers determined distribution of \$3.32 million to 18 local United Way Partner Agencies and 7 United Way Initiatives/Programs.
- •Thanks to the generosity of hard-working volunteers and to wise operational practices, over 91 cents of every dollar contributed to United Way went straight into programs that impact people in need.
