Time to Register Teens for Driver's Education is Now

Unlike recent years, young area drivers will have the opportunity for driver's education in June, and course registration is already open.

"We're glad to bring back a month-long driver's education program to St. Joseph this year," said Sheldon Lyon, Executive Director of The St. Joseph Safety and Health Council. Lyon said the course will give young drivers critical information to keep them safe while on the roadway,

Participants must have a learner's permit by the start of the class on June 4. Morning and afternoon sessions are planned at the Safety Council office, 3131 Frederick Avenue, Suite 220.

In addition to class instruction times, participants will schedule driving times with qualified driving instructors.



Class size for each of the two June sessions (morning and afternoon) of driver's education is limited to 50 students on a first-registered, first-served basis. Missouri students must be 15 to 19 years old. Kansas students must be 16 to 19 years old.

The program will include 30 hours of classroom instruction, six hours of driving and 12 hours of observing other drivers while in the car.

Cost per student is \$275. Scholarships are available for those who qualify.
