Some Lafayette High School students recently met for Breakfast with the Experts as arranged through United Way Speakers' Bureau. Groups of students from all three middle schools and from most of the junior highs have learned from people who work in a variety of jobs in our community this school year.

During the past school year, dozens of volunteers who work in St. Joseph have spoken with hundreds of students through United Way Speakers' Bureau.

According to Jodi Bloemker, United Way Director of Community Investment, the program came about two years ago in response to teachers' desires to connect with people from the community who work in a variety of careers to help students as they consider their own future career paths. The program is part of United Way Profit In Education[©] that aims to improve the education level of the potential and current workforce.

Through United Way Speakers' Bureau, adults representing different trades and professions share with students about their employers. They talk about different careers available with their businesses, training and education required for jobs at their workplaces and employer expectations. Presenters emphasize the importance of a high school diploma. They also discuss such topics as reliability, attitude, honesty, appearance, proper technology usage, volunteering and drug testing.

In line with its goal, the program has been exposing students to diverse careers in our community and helping them learn what it takes to secure particular positions.

More than 200 Benton students, freshmen through seniors, have learned about careers in their field of interest from people who do just that kind of job every day. "I especially liked that students also heard over and over the importance of soft skills like working on a team, communicating well and attitude," said Karrie Engel, Benton High School Counselor.
