Volunteers Read with Children Throughout the Year



Before the development of United Way Reading Adventure, St. Joseph elementary school principals identified the loss of reading skills during summer vacation as an issue for many children. The program is modeled after Hope Outreach Ministries which has been connecting children in low-income apartment complexes in St. Joseph with volunteer readers during the summers since 1994. Volunteers have read with children throughout this year and continue doing so in various settings across St. Joseph through United Way Reading Adventure.

The program partners with summer childcare programs for elementary age students and local businesses to connect volunteer readers and students on a weekly basis. Over the course of the summer, the program served six sites. A school-based version of United Way Reading Adventure is also held with the second grade classes at Title I elementary schools. During the 2016/17 school year, United Way is working with second graders at Lake Contrary, Humboldt, Coleman, Edison, and Mark Twain elementary schools.

United Way Reading Adventure is a reading program designed to help children maintain and improve reading skills. Through the program, volunteers read individually with a child or in small groups for 30 minutes once a week.

Thanks to a grant from the Dollar General Literacy Foundation, United Way Reading Adventure is able to give a new book to every second grader in the school-based program and to provide reading resources for the classrooms.

Safe Ride—A third group outlined a pilot program aimed to provide a safe mode of transportation for Missouri Western State University students during late night and weekend hours. The proposal is designed to prevent DWI offenses, alcohol-related accidents, and domestic abuse incidents. As currently envisioned, Safe Ride services could be provided by the university with funding from various sources and contained within the boundaries of the City of St. Joseph for students who live on or off campus. The group plans to hand their proposed program outline to the Student Government Association for potential continued development and implementation. Project elements include Conscious Discipline[®] training for parents and childcare providers, social-emotional assessments, and a partnership with Family Guidance Center to provide mental health consultation.

PARENTS LEARN TO PREPARE YOUNG CHILDREN FOR SCHOOL

United Way Success By 6[®] continues to work toward the goal of preparing all children to be successful learners when they begin kindergarten.

As a step toward that goal, the initiative aims to ensure that parents and other caregivers have knowledge and resources to facilitate their child's early development. United Way Family Fun Time is a monthly series of enjoyable events designed to help families with children under the age of six play together and to learn about

early development. This year's themes have been: trains, noodles, music, fitness, gratitude, and blocks. An average of 48 families have attended each event. Play Paths engage families in early learning activities while they enjoy a park.

This year, a new United Way Success By 6 Play Path was added to the sidewalk north of the Jumpin' Jungle Playground, located north of the Campus Family YMCA, 3601 North Village Drive. A total of three local Play Paths now provide different ways for children and adults to play together through sidewalk art, suggestions given through signage, and other fun learning features. United Way Success By 6 Play Paths are also located at Bartlett and Hyde parks.

A third way parents and caregivers can learn to prepare their children for kindergarten success is through United Way Success By 6 KinderClub. This year, the program helped parents prepare 247 students for kindergarten. Every KinderClub meeting begins with a read-aloud story followed by easy learning activities for parents to re-create at home. Children are given the school supplies needed for each lesson and their own copy of the book shared at the beginning of each meeting. Teachers explain the rationale for each activity with parents and share simple ways parents can continue their child's learning at home.
