Meet the 2017 United Way Campaign Chair

United Way will begin its second century of improving lives through the caring power of community with the leadership of the 2017 Campaign Chair, Ron Auxier.

Ron is a Principal Architect at Ellison-Auxier Architects and has been with the firm since 1981. His 40+ years of architectural and project management experience will be beneficial in building a strong team of volunteers and in planning this year's campaign.

"I love that United Way of Greater St. Joseph is local," said Ron. "The volunteers are local. The donors are local. And we're all working together to make a positive difference where we live." The 2017 United Way Campaign will officially begin Sept. 7, but Ron is already busy working with volunteers and staff, laying the groundwork for the fall kickoff.

As this year's campaign has been built, Ron has said that, even now, at the beginning of a second century of United Way work, he sees that every gift really will matter. "None of us can correctly assume that everyone else will give and make my gift unimportant or that someone else's larger gift can do more than my gift can." He reminds donors of the power created when each person gives what he/she can. "A building is erected as each beam, joist, and screw is pieced together; similarly, gifts can build up in ways that result in thousands of improved area lives if we're each adding our piece of the giving," said Ron.

He has a history of serving our community through United Way, not only as a current member of the Board of Directors, but also as a current and past participant in the allocations process, as a BEST (Business and Education Succeed Together) presenter, as a member of the Community Investment Council, and as a member of numerous other committees.

Community Leaders are Growing Through Local Leadership Class

Twenty-eight adults who share the desire to develop skills and knowledge to be effective leaders in our community have come together as the United Way Leadership St. Joseph Class of 2017.

After the two-day opening retreat in January, the class has met one day a month to learn about current opportunities and challenges in St. Joseph. The February class day included an overview of United Way and seven of the 17 United Way Partner Agencies in addition to leadership development training. The March time began with attributes of a healthy community and featured practical strategies to use when dealing with difficult people plus conflict resolution strategies. The day concluded with the class learning about our City

government. April time focused on local business and industry as the group learned about St. Joseph Chamber of Commerce and toured two manufacturing facilities in the morning. The class grew leadership skills through project management and collaboration in the afternoon. Their May day included leadership training related to elected political positions, learning about downtown St. Joseph and working in groups to create community project proposals. They will continue meeting monthly until graduation in December.

Two United Way Success By 6[®] summer programs are aimed to foster parents' roles as their children's first teachers.

One of them, United Way Kindergarten Jumpstart, consists of four weekly classes during the summer.

It helps children identified as needing additional skills and confidence before the school year begins.

As in the past, classes will again be led by early educators at some St. Joseph libraries for St. Joseph School District students and will focus on helping parents teach their children critical kindergarten preparation skills in the weeks leading up to the first day of school.

Business Speakers Connect With Hundreds of Students

Over the past school year, dozens of speakers have met with hundreds of students through United Way Speakers' Bureau.

The program came about two years ago in response to teachers' desires to connect with people from the community who work in a variety of careers to help students as they consider their own future career paths. The program is part of United Way Profit In Education® that aims to improve the education level of the potential and current workforce.

Through United Way Speakers' Bureau, volunteers representing different trades and professions share with students about their employers, different careers available with their businesses, training and education required for jobs at their workplaces, and employer expectations. Presenters emphasize the importance of a high school diploma and discuss such topics as reliability, attitude, honesty, appearance, proper technology usage, volunteering, and drug testing.

In line with its goal, the program has been exposing students to diverse careers in our community and helping them learn what it takes to secure particular positions.
